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




Wicked Force = Great Recession

cutting funding, not human need

Taking Money from Missions

Ripping the Safety Net Held by Nonprofits

- 1. Imposing New **Taxes** (*e.g.*, "sick bed") <u>and</u> Eliminating Tax-Exempt Status (*e.g.*, property tax, sales tax)
- 2. Assessing New "**Fees**" (*e.g.*, sewer usage "fee" and streetlight "fee")



- 3. Demanding "PILOTs" (Payments-in-Lieu-of-Taxes)
- 4. Latest trend → reassessing ("are you charitable enough?")

Next = Government Contracting



One-third of nonprofit community revenues <u>earned</u> from government contracts and grants.

Wicked Force Withholding Money from Nonprofits

- 1. Failure to Pay Full Costs (e.g., GAO) 54% problem Congrats, NJ! Worst in the nation → 76% report problems
- 2. Changing the Agreement Mid-Stream 43% problem
 NJ = 22nd worst in the nation → 45% report problems
- 3. Complexification of Application Process 72% problem
 NJ = 5th worst in the nation → 81% report problems
- 4. Complexification of Reporting 72% problem
 NJ = 12th worst in the nation → 75% report problems
- 5. Paying Late 45% problem

 NJ = 9th worst in the nation → 53% report problems

 Nonprofits on average owed:
- \$200,000+ by state governments; \$108,000 by federal, \$85,000 by local governments



Increasing demands for services


Percent of nonprofits reporting an increase in demand for their services over the previous year

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


Why Reforms re Indirect Costs Matter

Urban Institute's latest <u>nationwide</u> survey of nonprofits with government contracts/grants: 54% said that governments failing to pay full costs = problem, which creates pressure on others to subsidize government.

Urban Institute's latest <u>nationwide</u> survey of nonprofits with government contracts/grants: 54% said that governments failing to pay full costs = problem, which creates pressure on others to subsidize government.

Trend: Failure to pay indirect costs



Research: for-profit/nonprofit avg overhead range=25-35%

54% nonprofits report governments limit indirect costs

Of those governments ... a quarter paid = 0

half paid 7% or less

three-quarters paid 10% or less




Reforms in OMB Uniform Guidance

Some highlights

- State & local governments, tribes, and other "pass-through" entities
 using federal funds are now required to reimburse nonprofit
 contractors and grantees for reasonable indirect costs.
- In some cases, it expands which administrative expenses can be reported as direct costs, rather than indirect.
- Eliminates some duplicative audit criteria, and clarifies cost allocation rules.


