# HIGHLIGHTS

#### Princeton University's School of Public and International Affairs - Heather Howard

- <u>State Health and Value Strategies (SHVS)</u> assists states in their efforts to transform healthcare by providing targeted technical assistance to state officials and agencies. The program is a grantee of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, led by staff at Princeton University's School of Public and International Affairs.
  - The program connects states with experts and peers to undertake healthcare transformation initiatives.
- Affordable Care Act (ACA) celebrating 15 years
  - ACA has dramatically lowered the number of uninsured, reduced disparities, and ensured stable, affordable coverage during the pandemic. Lowest rate of uninsurance in NJ due to Medicaid expansion uninsurance is at 8%, significantly lower than national average.
- Medicaid Expansion
  - NJ FamilyCare now covers 1.8 million people: 1 in 5 New Jersians!
  - **Get Covered NJ** Enrollment in Get Covered New Jersey, the state's official health insurance marketplace, has more than doubled.
    - 90% of people enrolling in Get Covered NJ qualify for financial help.
  - Impact on Medicaid Congressional Budget Resolution Would Cut Medicaid
    - The potential reduction of the FMAP from 90% for Medicaid expansion populations to lower rates could jeopardize the state's ability to maintain current coverage levels.
    - Budget resolution instructs the House Energy & Commerce Committee (E&C) to reduce the federal deficit by at least \$880 billion over 10 years.
      - Medicaid comprises 93% of non-Medicare spending within E&C jurisdiction.
    - Medicaid plays a critical role in addressing housing insecurity and homelessness through a variety of authorities such as 1115 waivers, 1915i waivers, and in lieu of service which can cover services like tenancy, housing navigation, and limited rental assistance.

• Changes in eligibility rules and work requirements could further restrict access to Medicaid services.

• Consequences for Health Care Providers — Hospital Challenges

• Proposed funding cuts have dire consequences for health care providers, particularly those serving low-income populations.

• Hospitals are facing increased financial strain, impacting care quality and availability.

• Hospitals that rely heavily on Medicaid funding may face devasting financial implications if cuts occur, which could lead to reduced services or closures.

- $\circ\quad$  Cooper Hospital could lose \$63 million.
- $\circ \quad 1 \mbox{ out of 4 hospital patients are on Medicaid.}$

#### • Impact on Community

• Medicaid cuts extend beyond health care, affecting various social sections of health, including housing and food security.

• Seniors, individuals with disabilities, and low-income families are particularly at risk of losing vital services due to funding cuts.

• Effect on Mental Health

• Risk to mental health services due to potential funding cuts and reimbursement

# • Public Response and Advocacy

- Understanding executive and legislative actions is critical in shaping healthcare policy.
- Importance of raising awareness among communities and policymakers.
- Mobilizing community awareness and advocacy is necessary to protect Medicaid.
- Focus on educating policymakers about the potential impacts of Medicaid cuts on the health care system and vulnerable populations.

• Collaboration among stakeholders, including funders and health care providers, is essential to address the challenges posed by potential policy changes.

• The importance of grassroots advocacy, particularly from those directly affected by Medicaid cuts, cannot be overstated.

• Engagement in ongoing discussions about health care policy will be vital as New Jersey navigates these challenges in the coming years.
